Analysis of Variance

Every year, we have to send to the Ministry of Education a report of how our school achieved against our schoolwide target. Last year our target was:

"That 75% of boys are achieving at or above National Standards or Nga Whanaketanga Rumaki Maori by the end of 2014 or have shown accelerated learning progress within curriculum levels."

Note - the results displayed in the previous tables indicate boys who were at school at the beginning and end of year, which may reflect differently to the original target setting data and National Standards/Nga Whanaketanga due to students leaving and enrolling.

This year, our schoolwide target is:

"That all students will shift at least one sub-level within a curriculum level (or to the next level) in order to move closer to or be achieving at or above National Standards in Reading and Writing or Nga Whanaketanga Rumaki Maori mo Tuhituhi me Kōrero by the end of 2015."
